The Unknown Disciple

We now have four tombs to unknown soldiers. After World War I, the leaders of the Allied countries found that numerous soldiers killed in battle could not be identified. They decided to honor these soldiers by burying the remains of one soldier near each nation's capital. Our WW I soldier was buried on Armistice Day, November 11, 1921. Since then, soldiers from WW II, the Korean War, and the Vietnam War have been added.

The unknown soldiers typify most people who, in a small way, affect the outcome of history yet go unnoticed. One of Jesus' disciples, James, the son of Alphaeus, could well be called the "Unknown Apostle," because we know almost nothing about him. Yet he can be an encouragement to all Christians who probably will never make it into a "Who's Who" book.

We all would like some notice or appreciation once-in-awhile, to be thought somebody. Perhaps we start out idealistically, hoping to leave our mark on the world and to have an impact on others. But is receiving acclaim the route to satisfaction? If so, then surely we are setting ourselves up for disappointment. Even many of the men who reached the highest office in the land – president – have slipped from the memory of many. Here is where James, the son of Alphaeus, can teach us some lessons about satisfaction, joy, meaning in life, and contentment.

Like James, we can learn that satisfaction is found only in following Jesus. As one of the twelve disciples, James followed Jesus for three years, through persecutions and the crucifixion. James is still with the other disciples after all these difficulties, according to Acts 1:13. He and the other disciples found

in Jesus something found no where else. Perhaps Peter spoke for all the disciples when he said, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life" (John 6: 68). Isn't that enough?

Like James, we can find satisfaction from knowing Jesus knows us. Perhaps James looked at the other, more talented disciples, like Peter or John, and wondered why Jesus had chosen him. But Jesus continually reminded his disciples that he knew each of them individually and told them, "Have I not chosen you, the Twelve?" (John 6: 70). One day the disciples returned rejoicing over a successful preaching tour. Jesus reminded them, "...do not rejoice that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven" (Luke 10: 20). Why do we spend so much time trying to become known, to have our names written in a newspaper or a company newsletter, or to be praised by friends and associates? People forget so soon. When we follow Christ, our names are written for eternity in the one book that matters: God's Book of Life.

Like James, we can find satisfaction from faithfully serving Christ. Like the other disciples, James went out preaching, healing, helping feed the crowds, listening to Jesus, and ministering to people, as they traveled up and down Galilee and Judea. James heard Jesus tell the parable of the talents. He learned that as long as he was serving the Lord to the best of his God-given ability the Lord was pleased. James did not have to compete with the other disciples for the Lord's attention.

Though most of us are "unknowns," we still have the opportunity to experience satisfaction and contentment when our lives are lived for Christ, and we are somebody when our names are known to the Lord.

Making a Difference with Operation Christmas Child

Imagine your family on Christmas morning celebrating Christ's birth and sharing gifts with one another. Your beautiful Christmas tree sparkles, the fireplace and candles cast a warm glow, and the delicious aromas wafting from the kitchen signal that the Christmas meal is ready to be enjoyed.



please be sure to wrap the lid and the box separately, so that the box can be opened without tearing the paper.

Using the labels supplied in the Operation Christmas Child brochures, determine the gender and general age of your recipient. (Brochures will be available in the church lobby.)

Now, picture Christmas morning for people in an impoverished country. What we take for granted is unthinkable there. Clean running water, shelter, clothing, food – these are all daily struggles. Presents and all of the trimmings are something the children could not even begin to imagine.

With Operation Christmas Child, we have an opportunity to provide a special Christmas gift to needy children. In many cases, this could be the first present they will have ever received.

By simply packing a shoebox with items appropriate for children and enclosing \$7 for shipping, you can make a very personal difference in a child's life. In addition to the items you include in the shoebox, Samaritan's Purse also includes the Gospel, in the child's native language. For many children, this is their first opportunity to hear the Good News.

The Operation Christmas Child impact does not end there. Samaritan's Purse also provides a follow-up discipleship program, offering Bible courses to children and providing them with their own copy of the New Testament.

It is very easy to pack a shoebox for Operation Christmas Child. Simply start with a shoebox or a plastic box with a separate lid. If you wrap the shoebox,

Fill the box with small toys, school supplies, hard candy, hygiene items, etc. Do not include used or damaged items, perishable items, war-related toys, or aerosol cans. A complete list of ideas of items to include is listed in the brochure.

Please include a donation of \$7 for each box packed. (Make checks payable to Samaritan's Purse.) This covers the shipping costs required to transport the gift to its recipient.

You can also include a letter to the recipient, as well as photos, your address, etc.

National Collection Week is November 16, so **all boxes must be dropped off at Concord by Sunday, November 15.**

This is a wonderful ministry in which everyone can be involved. Parents, encourage your children to participate. When they are busy creating their never-ending Christmas wish list and dreaming of the latest transformer, littlest pet shop character, or ipod that they "just have to have," take the time to share with them the situation of many children in the world. Use this as an opportunity for them to grow in their spiritual walk by giving them a heart for these children.

Bruce and Barbara Wannemacher - South Africa

Bruce and Barbara Wannemacher grew up in northern Illinois and met in elementary school. They both became Christians through a campus ministry at college and married before their senior year. After graduation Bruce attended graduate school, earning a master's degree. He then served as a U.S. Army officer in the Medical Service Corps.

Desiring to serve in cross-cultural missions after military service, Bruce and Barbara pursued Bible training at Covenant Theological Seminary. They both graduated in 1998, Bruce with an M. Div. Degree and Barbara with an M.A. in general theological studies. During their seminary years, God confirmed their desire to serve cross-culturally through short-term missionary opportunities in England, Jordan, and Africa.

Bruce is on staff at the Bible Institute of South Africa in Cape Town, teaching in the classroom, discipling students one on one and leading a men's discipleship group in their home. The Bible Institute has two basic programs, one that awards a degree and another that is vital in training pastors already in the ministry who have had no formal theological schooling. The graduates are in vocational Christian ministry throughout the African continent, as well as mission, pastoral and parachurch work around the globe. This year, Bruce and another MTW missionary have helped to organize and start up a theological training center, Guguletu Bible College, which is located in the Guguletu Township near Cape Town. Additionally, Bruce is MTW Team Leader for the Western Cape in South Africa. In this capacity, he oversees the work and ministry of all MTW missionaries who are in the Western Cape region. He is also involved in recruiting and mentoring newly



assigned, long-term MTW missionaries in the field.

Barbara counsels and disciples women students at the Bible Institute and assists Bruce in training students in evangelism, outreach, etc. She also teaches a course, "Women in Ministry", for women students at the Bible Institute. Additionally, she continues to supervise a ministry of teaching the Bible in the public school system in a nearby poor township. This ministry, started in 2001, has been going continuously for nine years. Barbara directs a volunteer staff of about fifteen teachers who weekly, during the school year, give a Bible lesson to each of the 1,350 students in first through seventh grade. She is also involved in mentoring newly assigned women MTW missionaries in the field.

This summer, Bruce and Barbara enjoyed the privilege of participating in a church leadership training seminar in Lesotho, a small African kingdom within the borders of South Africa.

Bruce and Barbara have two grown children. Their son, Joshua, is 34 years old and serves in the United States Army – presently stationed at Ft. Monroe, VA. He is married and has two children. Their daughter, Beth, is 26 years old. She and her husband live and work in St. Louis, MO.

Recently, Bruce and Barbara asked for prayer for a Covenant Seminary student who is considering joining the faculty at the Bible Institute in Cape Town. The Wannemachers ask for prayer not only for him, but also for other career missionaries to join them in the work in South Africa. Finally, they ask for prayer for the financial health of individuals and for support of churches that are experiencing difficult times during the economic downturn.

As followers of Jesus Christ, the way we handle our money reflects our faith. That's what Paul's instructions in this passage are all about. In providing us with the Bible's most extensive discussion of financial stewardship, Paul offers several insights.

First, generosity is prompted by God's grace. (2 Cor. 8:1-2) The Macedonian Christians were destitute. Yet, when they heard about the financial needs of their Christian brothers in Jerusalem, they begged for the chance to give – and did so beyond what they could afford. Were the Macedonians somehow different from us? Hardly. They were just as concerned about paying their bills and feeding their kids as we are today. But they gave out of gratitude to God for the forgiveness and salvation he had given them. Generosity doesn't come naturally to most people. But gratitude for God's grace frees us from the tendency to keep a chokehold on our checkbooks.

Second, before we give our money to the Lord, we should give him ourselves. (2 Cor. 8:5) Once the Macedonians had given themselves to God, giving away their money was easy. In fact, they considered it a privilege. Never forget: God wants you before he wants yours. In fact, when God has you, he'll also have all you possess.

Third, when we give, we're following Jesus' example. (2 Cor. 8:9) Jesus chose to lay aside his divine glory, clothe himself with flesh and blood and live on earth in relative poverty. And then, with incomprehensible generosity, he gave his life for us. Jesus did this so that we who are spiritually poor could become rich beyond our wildest imagination. When you give your resources

to help others, you're reflecting Jesus' sacrificial love and generosity to you. Paul commended the Macedonians for doing just that.

Fourth, God enables us to give generously. (2 Cor. 9:6-11) The principle is simple: "As you sow, so shall you reap." Unfortunately, some people twist this passage and believe Paul is promising that if we give money to the Lord, he will give us more money back – as if God is some sort of celestial investment counselor. While God may grant you financial property in life, the Bible doesn't promise that he will or say that he must do so. Rather, Paul says here that if we give generously, God will make his grace abound to us (v. 8). God is able and willing to provide for us so we can give generously to his work (9:8, 11).

Finally, the amount of your gift doesn't matter – it's your attitude that counts. (2 Cor. 9:7) While the size of your gift should be guided by the resources you have, the Lord doesn't measure his approval of that gift by its dollar amount. Rather, he looks at your desire to give from what you have. God applauds an attitude of sacrificial giving, not necessarily the act of giving large gifts. (See Mark 12:41-44 for an excellent illustration of this principle.)

Ultimately, financial stewardship is an issue of submission to God and obedience to his will. Review these five principles again, and learn to live in such a way that your checkbook ledger reflects a life that's devoted to God.
